Description: Project SAFE is a clinical, research, and training program developed in partnership with the local community-based Child Advocacy Center (CAC). Project SAFE provides cognitive-behavioral-based group and brief individual therapy services to youth who have experienced sexual abuse and their non-offending caregivers. Project SAFE is a manualized treatment protocol which covers topics such as sexual education, emotions related to family changes, the abuse and perpetrator, support networks, coping skills, and self-advocacy.

Primary responsibilities:

- Co-facilitate treatment groups for children (ages 7-12), adolescents (ages 13-18), and their non-offending caregivers.
- Provide short-term individual psychotherapy for youth (ages 5-18) and their non-offending caregivers.

- Provide peer supervision and mentoring to graduate student therapists under the supervision of a licensed clinical psychologist.
- Revise treatment protocols and manuals, as well as create adaptations of therapeutic handouts for group use.
- As clinical coordinator, partner with the CAC clinical team to adapt the Project SAFE treatment program to their needs in preparation of transition to a CAC-ran model, as well as provide consultation services as a member of the CAC internal multi-disciplinary team and county multi-disciplinary investigation team.

Description: Whitehall is a residential treatment center for adolescent boys. Within this facility, there are two treatment programs: one for youth with substance use disorders and one for youth who have sexually harmed. Youth present with a variety of concerns including substance use disorders, paraphilias, and other co-occurring presentations (e.g., ADHD, oppositional/defiant behavior and conduct disorders, mood and anxiety disorders, trauma-related disorders). The program is designed to help youth address underlying mental health concerns and build the effective coping strategies, social skills, and problem-solving skills needed to reduce risk and prepare them for transitioning back into their communities.

Primary responsibilities:

- Conduct biopsychosocial intake assessments utilizing evidence-based measures including a comprehensive interview (i.e., PADDI-5), cognitive measures (e.g., MOCA, WISC-IV), NSSI risk assessment (i.e., C-SSRS), personality assessment (i.e., MACI-II, PAI-A), emotional/behavior measures (e.g., BASC-3 SRP-A, CATS), and program specific measures (e.g., ASAM, YNPS) to create an integrated report with treatment recommendations.
- Obtain collateral information from outside agencies (e.g., probation, law enforcement, prior evaluations, school) to inform diagnostic considerations and treatment needs.
- Co-facilitate CBT-based group therapy targeted to reduce risk and prevent relapse.
- Conduct monthly treatment progress assessments with each youth to present to the multi-disciplinary treatment team and external agencies (e.g., probation) at scheduled treatment review meetings.
- Participate in internal multidisciplinary team meetings to discuss youth treatment needs and areas of concern.

Description: The Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Clinic is housed within the University of Nebraska Medical Center and serves children presenting with emotional, behavioral, and/or cognitive concerns. The clinic provides various services for children and their families including comprehensive psychological evaluations, outpatient psychotherapy, and pharmacotherapy.

Primary responsibilities:

- Provide evidence-based outpatient psychotherapy to children and families with emotional and behavioral concerns, including Behavioral Parent Training, Parent Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT), Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, and aspects of Dialectical Behavior Therapy.

- Conduct comprehensive psychological evaluations for children and adolescents with various presenting concerns (e.g., ADHD, ASD, OCD, learning disability, mood and anxiety concerns, disruptive and oppositional behavior, co-occurring complex presentations).
- Write integrated reports using assessment information, which include cognitive tests (e.g., WISC-V), emotional/behavioral measures (e.g., BASC-3, ECBI, ABAS-3, ASRS, NICHQ Vanderbilt ADHD Diagnostic Scales, SCARED, CY-BOCS), and a clinical interview.

Description: The Psychological Consultation Center (PCC) is the on-campus clinic for the Clinical Psychology Training Program at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln. The PCC provides a variety of mental health services to the community in Lincoln and southeast Nebraska.

Primary responsibilities:

- Provide outpatient psychotherapy in-person and via telehealth to adult and adolescent clients with a variety of presenting concerns, using evidence-based interventions (e.g., DBT, CPT, CBT).
- Conduct diagnostic intake interviews, as well as administer, score and interpret psychological assessments (e.g., BASC-3, DASS-Y, PHQ-9, PCL-5, GAD).
- Provide peer feedback during group supervision.

Description: Head Start is a school readiness and child development intervention program for families and children who have been identified to be at risk in the community. The non-profit program provides prenatal services to enhance the development of infants and toddlers, and provides services at an early age, which has a significant impact on a child's growth and development. Additionally, Head Start allows parents to get involved with in their child's development, offers home-based and center-based program options, provides nutrition, medical and dental care, and ensures social and emotional engagement for enrolled children.

Primary responsibilities:

- Provide direct consultation to home visitors, program supervisors, and other staff on various topics (e.g., early childhood development milestones, emotion regulation for parents and young children, domestic violence, suicide prevention, safety planning, behavioral modification techniques for toddlers).
- Provide personalized referrals to mental health services for families.
- Facilitate staff training on special interest topics, such as adverse childhood experiences and approaches for talking with caregivers about trauma.
- Assess child and family needs through screening for child behavioral problems and environmental concerns, caregiver depression, and parenting practices utilizing measures such as the BESS-R and the CESD-R to develop assessment reports including recommendations.
- Develop psychoeducational mental health resources.

Description: This behavioral health unit housed within Ascension Borgess Hospital provides inpatient psychiatric care to patients experiencing acute and chronic mental health problems. The four units include a wing for adolescents (ages 11-17), adults, and geriatric patients experiencing a range of mental health symptoms and diagnoses (e.g., mood disorders, dementia, substance use/withdrawal, severe mental illness), many of whom are admitted involuntarily following unsafe or erratic behaviors.

Primary responsibilities:

- Provide patient care and facilitate activities of daily living.
- Monitor, assess, and document patient behavior and affect.
- Conduct nightly group therapy consisting of goal setting, psychoeducation, coping strategies, peer support, group activities, and art therapy for up to 20 patients.
- Provide one-on-one supervision to actively suicidal patients.
- Compassionately re-orient and de-escalate confused or agitated patients.
- Maintain certification in Basic Life Support, Crisis Prevention Intervention, and yearly competency tests (e.g., assessing suicide risk and safe use of restraints).
